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

#### TEXAS CREATES LODGE ON MOON!

The GL of Texas has now laid claim to the moon as coming within its jurisdiction in the following terms (edited for space):

On July 20, 1969, two American astronauts landed on the moon of the planet Earth, in an area known as Mare Tranquillitatis, or "Sea of Tranquillity." One of those men was Brother Edwin Eugene (Buzz) Aldrin, Jr., a member of Clear Lake Lodge No. 1417,

AF&AM, Seabrook, Texas. Brother Aldrin carried with him SPECIAL DEPUTATION of then Grand Master J. Guy Smith, constituting and appointing Brother Aldrin as Special Deputy of the Grand Master, granting unto him full power to represent the Grand Master as such and authorize him to claim Masonic Territorial Jurisdiction for The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Texas, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, on the Moon, and directed that he make due return of his acts. Brother Aldrin certified that the SPECIAL DEPUTATION was carried by him to the Moon on July 20, 1969.

To commemorate this historic event, and to further solidify and establish Texas

Freemasonry on the Moon, it is proposed that a charter be issued to a new Lodge, to be known as Tranquility Lodge No. 2000.

#### Extracts from GL of Texas Constitution:

Tranquility Lodge No. 2000, whose see is in the Sea of Tranquility on the Moon of the planet Earth, now setting in Waco, Texas, is hereby established for the purpose of promoting, encouraging, conducting and fostering the principles of Freemasonry, and to assist in promoting the health, welfare, education and patriotism of children, subject to the following regulations and restrictions.

Any Master Mason who is a member in good standing in any regular Lodge in this jurisdiction, or in any jurisdiction in fraternal relations with this Grand Lodge, may become a member of Tranquility Lodge No. 2000, by payment of a one time fee of \$100.00, and such annual dues as adopted by the Lodge. Membership shall continue only so long as such member is in good standing in a regular Lodge in this Jurisdiction, or one in fraternal relations with this Grand Lodge.

Membership cards, upon forms prescribed by the Grand Secretary, may be issued by Tranquility Lodge No. 2000 to its members, but such cards shall not serve as an avouchment of good standing for the purposes of visitation or membership in a regular Lodge.

Tranquility Lodge No. 2000 shall operate under the provisions of this Article until such time as it can relocate to its rightful place in or near the Sea of Tranquility, on the Moon of the planet Earth; and upon relocation, it shall apply to Grand Lodge for charter as a Regular Lodge, and when such charter is granted, this Article shall become null and void."

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

#### **OUR LAST MEETING**

Following on from the presentation by Bro. David Phillips, a small group has been formed to husband the development and introduction of a mentoring mechanism for the lodges in the area. This is proof positive of the outcomes we all can share when a

dispensation only by the Grand Master, or the Deputy Grand Master, or the Assistant Grand Master, (or by the Provincial Grand Master within a Province) no Masonic Office or Appointment shall be held or be extended beyond a period of ten years from date of Installation or Appointment.

A Brother shall not be eligible to serve a second term in an Office or Appointment that he has already held for a period of ten years, even after an interval of time shall have elapsed. This Resolution shall not however encompass the paid Officers of the Grand Lodge, or of a Provincial Grand Lodge, whose terms and conditions of employment shall remain as heretofore; nor shall it apply to Actual or Honorary Past Grand Officers or Past Provincial Grand Officers, or Elected Members of The Grand Lodge of Instruction."

VALE LEINSTER MARINE No. 2? (taken from the on-line notice posted by Bro. Ron Atkinson, Secretary)

"It is with great sadness I write to let all know that the current notice paper from Australia's 2<sup>nd</sup> oldest Lodge, Leinster Marine Lodge of Australia, No. 2 UGL of NSW&ACT has a notice of motion appearing stating that the lodge to hand in its Charter. It is such a shame to see a Lodge that was formed on 24th February 1824, making it 176 years old next February, and also being a Lodge which contributed so much to the formation of not only our own Grand Lodge, but that of Freemasonry in Australia, finally close its Lodge VSL (the original one) for the very last time. To the 2100 men whose names and details are printed in our History book (all men since the foundation) we feel that we have let you down by not being in a position to make the lodge continue into this millennium. Should some miracle occur and give the lodge mouth to mouth resuscitation, I will let you know with pleasure. To anybody who has had contact with the Lodge, thank you, and good bye."

**DEACONS - SOME EARLY BACKGROUND**(Taken from Carr's *The Freemason at Work*)

The principal duty associated with the office of Deacon nowadays, i.e. the conducting of candidates during the ceremonies, was originally discharged by the Wardens of the Lodge. In the first well-detailed description of the ceremonies, Prichard's *Masonry Dissected*, 1730, it is evident that the JW received the candidate (as does the IG today) and, after some form of perambulation, the cand. Was handed over to the SW who 'presented' him and showed him how to advance towards the Master by three steps.

As Prichard's work was an exposure; there is no proof that what it describes was correct, but support is found in the French exposures *Le Secrets* (1742) and *Trahi* (1745).

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

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

They place great emphasis on the additional degrees, investing them with a spurious antiquity, and read a great deal more into their

esoteric content and symbolism than was ever intended.

John Yarker is probably the major figure of this school. His *magnum opus*, *The Arcane Schools* (Belfast, 1909), is a monument to misapplied scholarship. It reveals not only the breadth of his reading but also his inability to digest, or in some cases understand, what he had read."

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

Their gloves are of sky blue taffeta, trimmed around with gold, as are their tunics and ribbons, which are also of sky blue. Their shoes are made of sky blue material, the tops embroidered in gold and with a cockade of burgundy ribbon, the ends trimmed with gold lace or fringe, the gloves and the collar of the Master, who must have a golden belt. He has a hat in the style of Louis XIV on his head and his tunic is adorned with stars embroidered in gold.

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

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

## A NEW MASONIC ORDER (an extract from a Dutch web site)

The Order of St. Thomas of Acon

"This is one of the youngest masonic orders at this moment. It was instituted in 1974 in England and has at the moment eight local groups (Chapels) in England, one in Canada and two in

the United States. The establishment of a Chapel in Belgium, one in Wales and another four in England are planned before the end of 2000 or in the first half of 2001. The Order has a little more than 300 members. The Order has only one degree which is worked.

The Order is totally restricted to freemasons who are members of the Order of the Temple and St John in Jerusalem. The theme of the Order is the story of Thomas à Becket and the Chapel which was built in his memory in Acon in the Holy Land."

The inclusion of this URL should not be considered as this Lodge endorsing or condoning of the placement of large slabs of ritual into the public domain. I have no means of telling whether the rituals contained on the site are accurate or current. *Caveat emptor*.

## EARLY DAYS IN YASS FREEMASONRY

This year marks the 140<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the foundation of the Yass Lodge of Concord. Included in the minutes for the first regular meeting (18 July 1860) was a report of the preliminary meeting which led to the formation of the Lodge:

"At a meeting of Free and Accepted Masons, held at the Commercial Hotel, Yass, on the evening of Monday, the 28th May, 1860 -

Present:- Brothers Myers, Taylor, Godfrey, Patison, Brown, Turner, and visiting Brother Franklin (843 E.C.) Brother Brown was called to the chair.

Having been duly obligated, it was unanimously decided that a petition should be prepared & forwarded to the Provincial Grand Lodge for a dispensation to enable the Brethren to open a regularly constituted Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons in the town of Yass, under the denomination of "The Yass Lodge of Concord"

The preliminary meeting was called by means of a public notice in the *Yass* 

Courier of 9 May 1860 under the heading 'MASONIC':

A meeting of FREEMASONS resident in and near Yass, will be held at the COMMERCIAL HOTAL, Yass, THIS (WEDNESDAY) EVENING. at Eight o'clock, on business of importance. All Members of the Fraternity are respectfully requested to attend.

The notice was surmounted by illustrations of a square and compasses, trowel, plumb and square, chisel and maul. I will show interested brethren the original notice at the next meeting.

In the next issue of the Yass Courier (16 May 1860) there is a report of the meeting, stating that a warrant to form the Lodge would be sought. It reads, in part, 'There was a good attendance and the utmost harmony prevailed. ... Mr Jacob Myers consented to find accommodation in the Cricketers' Arms Inn for the meetings of the brethren.'

TRANSACTION OF THIS LODGE

Action is currently under way to review the papers presented in this Lodge to see if there is sufficient material of quality for inclusion in a 'best of' type booklet. Particular emphasis will be given to material presented in the 1960s and 1970s. All interested brethren are invited to be involved in this exercise and should contact the Secretary for further details.

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

## BRO. SANDY STONE -A BRIEF MASONIC BIOGRAPHY

I'm a Mason. As a matter of fact my friends, little Wayne and Marilyn Nettleton, are always at me to teach them the secret Masonic handshake, but naturally I would not divulge. But the

Lodge intrigues kiddies: kiddies are intrigued by the Lodge. It stands to reason - a hundred and fifty men locked in one room with nothing but a trowel and a goat. That would seem peculiar, I suppose, to a kiddie. Being a Mason, I always carry a sprig of acacia in my pocket in case of a funeral: I can divulge that. That many funerals in my book these days, I just about denuded the bush - I'll be sneaking into the Botanicals at night next! We carry a sprig of acacia and we drop it in the graveside, or on the casket if the festivities are up at the Springvale cremmie.

The Life and Death of Sandy Stone (p87), 1990.

Bro. Stone's Lodge met on a Thursday (see *Days of the Week*). Inquiries of UGLV have found no record of a Bro. Stone who fits the few biographical details available in the printed record. We know that he lived at Humoureske Street, Hartwell; Mont Albert; and *Kia Ora*, 36 Gallipoli Crescent, Glen Iris.

Alexander Horace (Sandy) Stone died on 7 April 1971 at his home in Glen Iris. He was not afforded a Masonic funeral. His regalia was kept on the top of the wardrobe in the main bedroom.

It is possible that Bro. Stone was a member of the Lodge of Hartwell No. 597, which met at the Canterbury Temple. It was formed in 1946 and returned its warrant in 1993. Other Lodges which met at Canterbury on a Thursday night were St Oswald 442. Ashburton 563, and Sir Francis Drake 770. The last is also a possibility as Bro. Stone was a bowler. Perhaps he was initiated in Lodge of Hartwell and later affiliated with Sir Francis Drake. None of these Lodges is still in existence, although St Oswald 442 is now The Ashwald Lodge, having consolidated with Ashburton 563, and kept the lowest number.

He) The walkers walked me around the Lodge. The Talkers talked to me and to the Walkers as I was led around.

He) They seem to be a special class of men - all in dark blue and gold aprons and gauntlets. They just sit on the benches around the Lodge with their heads in their hands chanting repeatedly - "Oh My God! Oh My God!"

It seems that another Mason, Master of his Lodge, went to Heaven and met with St. Peter. He identified himself as a member of the Craft and St. Peter asked, "What Lodge?" Proudly the Master replied, "Lodge Federal Capital." St. Peter immediately took him to the Masonic Clock Room. The Master, in puzzlement, looked around the room which was filled with clocks. Each clock had a Lodge's name on a brass plate and, strangely enough, each clock was at a different time. He asked why and St. Peter informed him that the hands only moved when someone in that Lodge made a mistake in the Ritual. The Master then asked where his Lodge's clock was as he couldn't see it. St. Peter replied, "Why, it's in the kitchen, of course." "The kitchen," said the Master? "Yes, you see, we needed a new fan."
