

## WORK OF THE EVENING

# "A Freemasonry for the Twenty-first Century: Looking Back at the Enlightenment to Move Forward"

By Jeffery Marshall President, Maryland Masonic Research Society 22 August 2005

Good evening and thank you all for coming to the Maryland Masonic Research Society's 2005 Festive Board. I hope that you have had a wonderful dinner and a great evening so far. I'd like you to take a moment to look around the room at your fellow Masons here. This is the future of Freemasonry. Not necessarily the individual Masons here, but rather what you all - and we as a collective society - represent. We have Masons from several different jurisdictions here, sharing a Masonic experience. Some are black, some are white. Some are men, some are women. But most of us are Masons. We may not be able recognize each other or sit in a tyled lodge together, but at least in this group, we recognize the shared Masonic experience.

We are a diverse group, but diversity is not our strength. Rather, our strength is that we are all Masons, called together by a common set of core values. The ritual and wording may very somewhat from Grand Lodge to Grand Lodge, but we all share some form of the tenets of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth. We all share a more or less common initiatic experience that ties us together with the Mystic Tie. No, diversity for diversity's sake is probably a meaningless quest. I don't think Masonry celebrates diversity. Rather, each candidate must knock, seek, and ask for initiation individually. The Preston-Webb ritual in the Entered Apprentice Degree tells us that we judge Masons by their internal, not their external qualities. In the ways that perhaps count most, we are not really a diverse group. We all subscribe to a common set of core values that revolve around the tenets of Freemasonry.

But the Freemasonry we often find today does not have the surface diversity that we see in this room. In spite of the move to recognize Prince Hall Freemasonry, there are significant barriers in the Masonic family.

This discussion is not, however, about a call to integrate our Grand Lodges both racially and between the sexes. That is neither the prerogative of the Maryland Masonic Research Society nor something that will happen overnight. For example, even though the Grand Lodge of Maryland and the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Maryland have established relations, there are many other traditionally black grand lodges that are not included in this agreement. Some of the grand lodges are clearly irregular in practice. Others, however, may be irregular in origin, but not irregular in practice.

Rather, this discussion is about how perhaps we can learn something from the eighteenth century Freemasonry both good and bad - and perhaps help twenty-first century Freemasonry become more vibrant.

## WILMSHURST ON THE NET

Wilmshurst's thoughts on the Holy Royal Arch have been 'hijacked' by the [irregular] Regular Grand Lodge of England, and can be found on their site.

### THE PURPOSE OF FREEMASONRY

Brother Wilmshurst's words, used by him at the dedication of the Temple at Leeds used by the Lodge of Living Stones:

"So many brethren unfortunately regard our system as confined to the familiar Three Craft Degrees and to the formal making of Masons. They are unaware, or they do not reflect, that those three ceremonies are merely personal to the candidates for Masonry; they are but rites of admission to the Craft, rites defining the candidate's status in it; they are details within the much larger scheme which constitutes the Craft's real field of work and which every Mason is called to promote according to his capacity as Apprentice, Fellowcraft or Master. That larger field of work, as you know, is impersonal, cosmic, wide as humanity, for it has to do with the rebuilding of the temple of the whole of humanity."

#### THE OPENING – THE L.O.L.S. WAY

There is one piece of ceremonial, seldom seen, and even then by no means fixed in its form, yet which merits a few words in passing, the ceremony of lighting the candles of the Principal Officers. Those of you who have had opportunity to visit the Lodge of Living Stones know how impressive and how beautiful this ceremony can be. And it is right that more attention should be given to the preparation of these lights than is usually the case. The modern practice of substituting electric imitations for the symbolic candles disturbs the whole symbolism. For the intended symbolism to be correctly carried out and to be effective, it is necessary that the lights be naked flames of such a nature that they follow the fuel downwards as they consume it. Thus the Fuel sacrifices itself through the medium of the Wick for the benefit of the Flame, the Body sacrifices itself through the Soul for the unfolding of the Spirit. Thus, each Light is three-fold and the three taken together form the mystic 3 x 3. The

keynote of the symbolism is Sacrificial Service. So must the Physical be subjugated to the service of the Soul; so must the Soul be subjugated to the service of the Spirit; so must the Spirit be subjugated to the service of T.G.A.O.T.U., represented by the "G" at the Centre, which is sometimes, as in the case of the "Lodge of Living Stones," reinforced by a perpetually burning flame from which the fire is carried to the three Lights. This flame is, of course, the Monad, the Divine Spark around which the man, as we know him, is built. The triple nature of the three-fold sacrifice finds many different forms of expression, one of the most erudite being found in the Calvaries of Christendom.

#### PRESS RELEASE ON WILMSHURST, AND LOMAS! [1 August 2005] Huddersfield Mason's resource uncovered in Headingley

One of the greatest thinkers about Freemasonry in the last century was a Yorkshire solicitor called Walter Leslie Wilmshurst. He was born in Chichester in 1867 and died on a visit to London in 1929. From the age of 21 until his death he practiced law from an office in Kirkgate, Huddersfield. In 1922, 33 years after being made a Mason in the Huddersfield Lodge (No. 290), he wrote a book entitled The Meaning of Masonry, expressing his thoughts and reflections on the Craft as he understood it. Dr. Lomas discovered that Walter Wilmhurst's working notes and his private Masonic library, including his proof copy of *The Meaning of* Masonry, printed by Percy Lund, Humphries and Company of Bradford, was stored in a closed collection in Headingley, Leeds, where it had been lost to public view for over 70 years. Dr. Lomas has since been transferring a lot of this material into electronic form and making it available on the Web of Hiram. Dr Lomas said: "Adding to this online collection has become a ritual for me now and whilst researching all the published writings of W. L. Wilmshurst, I have been transferring my research material into electronic form. The result is a new archive of many of W. L. Wilmhurst's books and articles. I'm particularly excited about the papers he wrote for the *Occult Review*, which are little known but give great insight into his thinking. To coincide with the publication of Dr Lomas' new book, Turning the Hiram Key, he has opened a new section of the Web of Hiram. called The Works of Walter Leslie Wilmshurst, Dr. Lomas added: "It has three of his most important Masonic books in full as well as the complete text for articles he published in various magazines with titles such as The Fundamental Philosophic Secrets with Masonry, The Mystical Basis of Freemasonry, The Working Tools of an Old York Master and thoughts on Spurious Ecstasy and Ceremonial Magic. "It also shows Wilmshurst's own Tracing Board of the Centre - a Masonic diagram lost for over 70 years, but now available on the web."


From the CDMA minutes:

For those who were not able to attend, most of the papers, together with papers from previous seminars, are available from the Secretary.


